The District of Ucluelet has developed an early concept design for Peninsula Road based on community input received in 2019-2021.

Please join us to share your input and help inform our next steps through detailed design and into construction.

- ► The alignment of these opportunities is timesensitive and specific to **2022/2023**.

#### SUMMER/ FALL 2021 CONCEPTUAL DESIGN, GRANT SUBMISSION, GRANT AWARD

Based on community input and plans from 2019 through 2020, a Conceptual Design package was developed in **2021** to support a **grant funding** application.

The grant application was successful and funding was awarded in 2021.

## JANUARY OFFICIAL COMMUNITY PLAN (OCP) ADOPTION

The aims for Peninsula Road and terms for this project were further defined by the District of Ucluelet's **2020 Official Community Plan**(adopted January, 2022).

# WINTER REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS & CONSULTING PROJECT AWARD

With funding in place, the District prepared a public Request for Proposals and awarded the consulting engineering and design for the Peninsula Road Safety & Revitalization Project (launched March 2022).








WHAT DOES THE OCP (OFFICIAL COMMUNITY PLAN) SUGGEST FOR PENINSULA ROAD? The Official Community Plan (adopted January 2022) identifies Peninsula Road as the gateway and main approach into Ucluelet, a focal point for the District's image and streetscape character, and a priority for accessibility and active transportation (pedestrian, cycle, and transit service).

The OCP Transportation Network Schedule (see map below) identifies the following for Peninsula Road from Forbes Road to Main Street: multi-use pathway (MUP), future dedicated bike lanes, and future shared lane (car/bike).

The OCP policies provide overall guidance for this project.









**FUN FACT!** Approximately 3,200 vehicle trips enter/exit Ucluelet via Peninsula Road each day. This figure increases by approximately 50% during summer months (that is nearly 5,000 trips/day during busy times!)

### NORTH SIDE

► No designated cycling paths or routes


Areas where un-designated parking occurs on the road

shoulder can create an uncomfortable condition where

pedestrians must walk within the traveled roadway.

- Fragments of pedestrian routes / sidewalks that are not continuous and do not have ramp let-downs for accessibility
- ► Road shoulder with no separation from vehicle travel lanes for pedestrians and cyclists

The crosswalk above, near Main Street, provides an example of a safe crossing location with curb ramps that are accessible for all, including those using a mobility aid. In some locations, existing sidewalks abruptly end presenting an issue for pedestrians, particularly those with mobility aids or accommodations.





SOUTH SIDE

- No designated cycle route east of Seaplane Base Road
- ► Continuous sidewalk from Seaplane Base Road to Main Street, typically separated from roadway by a grass boulevard











The existing multi-use pathway (MUP) between Forbes Road and Seaplane Base Road is adjacent to the roadway and intersects numerous driveways which creates an experience that can be uncomfortable for pedestrians and cyclists of all ages and abilities.



Areas where parked cars back over pedestrian/cycle routes and onto Peninsula Road present issues for visibility and conflict with pedestrians and cyclists.



Main Street and Peninsula Road is a challenging intersection due to steep grades and the approach angle of Main Street.
