- Currently facing increasing enrollment with increasing budget cuts. Report from special education teacher showed need for five new EA and PA positions; funds required for a special needs student is \$32,000 (1 FTE) and \$16,000 (0.5 FTE) for a student with chronic health issues

• Highway 4 is becoming overgrown and replacement of reflectors on the road has still not taken place; would like a timeline and commitment from EMCON

Sidewalk Status

• Need a report from staff with schedule for when key items will be completed <u>Strategic Planning Session</u>

• Mayor Irving will be calling for a strategic planning session to discuss useage, repair and replacement of priority buildings, i.e. the UAC Hall and Rec Hall in next two weeks

**RCMP** Consultation

- Over several meetings with RCMP, top priorities for the District of Ucluelet were determined to be:
  - Bylaw for noise and parking
  - Safe roads and traffic complaints
  - Substance abuse
  - Police/Community relations

Coast Guard Closure

- Federation of Canadian Municipalities is hosting meeting in Vancouver this weekend; Minister James Moore will be speaking, providing opportunity to continue discussion of coast guard closure
- At Lower Mainland MP's suggestion, Council will be presenting coast guard issue to B.C. Caucus in next few days

<u>Aljazeera Television</u>

- Reporters from Aljazeera were in town for past two days to do a story on tsunami debris and to profile efforts taken by the District of Ucluelet to manage the issue
- International story on Ucluelet should be released in next four weeks

Community Forest

• Minister of Aboriginal Relations are tasking person to resolve issue of boundary extension; project is currently stalled while issue is resolved

### VIHA

- Consultation with Vancouver Island Health Authority board in Tofino on May 27, 2013 where Mayor Irving stated concerns over downsizing of services in our community and intention to follow-up with new Minister of Health when he/she is appointed

Re: water quality issues

On the evening of May 7, 2013, one of our guests called the office to report that the water coming out of the taps in the unit was black. The water was so black, it was like the colour of coffee and had particulate in it, like coffee grounds, which horrified the guests. A veteran of Afganistan, his comment was, "I have been all over the world, to the far North, Afganistan and other 3<sup>rd</sup> world countries, and I have never seen water like this." He couldn't even bathe in it.

We want to say that Public Work response was absolutely stellar (Tim responded in this case). They came out and helped us drain our lines and even talked to the guests to convince them to stay. Even after explaining that the water quality was not the fault of the hotel and had been caused by the fire department practice stirring up the particulate in the town water lines, the guests chose to leave.

We lost 3 rooms (all business guests traveling together) for a total of 3 room nights. The guests went to a hotel in Tofino, instead. This is not the first time we have lost guests due to black water coming from our taps and as recently as a couple of months ago, we found a small twig in the spigot (cartridge was blocked) in one of our unit bathroom sink faucets. From time to time, it is impossible to add water to the swimming pool or do laundry.

We realize that there are challenges with the water here and that the district is working on improvements to the situation. When the ice plants or the fire department decide to draw huge amounts of water, however, it affects everyone in the town. Since the fire department was just practicing, why is it necessary to open the hydrant at full blast and stir up so much sediment? Is it not possible to open the hydrant at a lesser flow rate to begin with and then slowly increase the water flow, in order to reduce the sediment being stirred up, since this is a practice and not a response to a real fire? Also, it would be nice to have some warning. We have also had to leave our outdoor fire valve on for quite a bit of time to clear the lines, which costs money, as well, since we are on a meter.



MEETING DATE: TUESDAY, JUNE 11, 2013 FROM: MANDALA SMULDERS, YOUTH COORDINATOR SUBJECT: UPDATE ON YOUTH PROGRAMS

## Purpose:

To provide Mayor and Council with an update on youth programs in and around Ucluelet.

# Long-term Overview:

This report will focus on three components in order to report on successes and evaluate the current operation of youth programs. The three main components include:

- 1. **Programming:** Maintaining engagement of youth, youth involvement/leadership in planning, capacity building, and success of creating programs that are meaningful and relevant.
- Partnerships and Funding: Who we are currently working with and who we wish to work with over the long term in order to provide teens with the best possible programs. Local, regional, national grant opportunities and social programs that are available. This section also includes grants that we have received and plans that we have for this funding.
- **3. Testimonials:** Measuring the effects of having consistent hours of The Edge Youth Room and regular programming for youth; the primary focus is on the changes of youth behavior around the community, outside of the youth room.

# **Detailed Principles:**

### **Programming:**

### Youth Drop-in

Since October there has been a steady increase in the number of teens who use the Teen Room. When I first started as Youth Coordinator there were on average, about 2-3 teens that would come in and use the room. Now, on any given day there will be anywhere between 8 and 20 teens using the room; the majority of these teens are from Ucluelet, however, they come from a variety of backgrounds and would not necessarily otherwise interact with one another. The room is primarily used as a place for the teens to come and play cards, do homework, talk about life, cook food, do art projects and just hang out with one another. This room has encouraged new, healthy relationships between the teens as they are given a place to get to know new people outside of school hours. Every week there are at least one or two new faces that have not visited the youth room before; more often than not, these teens end up being return youth room visitors.

The variety of programs that are run and coordinated out of the youth room have brought participants from all over the region and have affected between 40-50 teens over the past few months. With a high school population of 180 students; this means that we are reaching out to approximately one third of the teen population in a very short amount of time.

Having the youth drop-in centre and an office available to plan out of, we have been able to offer a large variety of programs, both structured and not. Some of the programs include SUPing, surfing, Mt. Washington trips, movie nights, art classes, photography classes, pie baking, tie-dying, and theatre related out-trips. By offering a wide range of programs that are sometimes structured and other times very unstructured, we are able to target many teens with different interests and backgrounds. The goal of every program is to be inclusive and low-barrier to ensure all teens feel welcome.

A primary goal of the youth programs is to encourage social interactions between teens and their community. The goal is to encourage teens to take on leadership roles, interact with their community members, work with community organizations and volunteer their time. The youth room has provided a space where teens are building a base of trust, and therefore, a sense of belonging within their own peer community. By building a sense of belonging within their peer groups, over time, teens will feel more comfortable interacting with the rest of the community. There have been efforts to get teens involved in beach clean-ups, volunteer with the Ucluelet Aquarium, and partake in community planting days and Japanese Knotweed removal with Central Westcoast Forest Society. Community outreach efforts have been less successful than other programs due to a number of circumstances, however, community outreach programs will continue to be planned for the future in hopes that teens

will become more interested as they gain an increased sense of place and belonging within their community.



# Partnerships and Funding:

Partnerships have been divided into three main components to clearly demonstrate how significant partnerships are to the success of youth activities. The three partnership components are: Resource Partnerships, Programming Partnerships and Funding Partnerships.

### **Resource partnerships**

Resource partnerships help to ensure success of the youth room and youth programs by providing the required information, materials and background. These partnerships help to make community members aware of youth related activities and in turn, ensure that the teens and the youth coordinator feel supported by their community. Our current resource partnerships include:

- Coastal Family Resource Coalition
- Nuu-chah-nulth Tribal Council
- Pacific Rim National Park
- Yuułu?ił?atḥ First Nation
- Ucluelet RCMP
- Ucluelet Secondary School
- Vancouver Island Heath Authority
- Westcoast Community Resources Society

We partner with Westcoast Community Resources Society on a regular basis to offer teens well rounded support. Waylon McLeod and Sarah Hogan of Westcoast Community Resources Society have been excellent resources; they provide the information and resources required to approach problems surrounding at-risk teens. The Ucluelet Secondary School continues to be a active partner with The Edge Youth Room; they provide valuable information on teen interests and needs to ensure programs are meeting requirements and filling necessary gaps.

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### Programming partnerships

Programming partnerships help to ensure that teens are provided with a variety of opportunities to meet all of their interests. Partnerships are chosen to ensure that teens are exposed to new activities to help challenge themselves and broaden their horizons. Our current programming partnerships include:

- District of Tofino
- Central Westcoast Forest Society
- Endless Ride Fitness
- Pacific Rim Arts Society
- Relic Surf Shop
- Westcoast Community Resources Society
- Yuułu?ił?atḥ First Nation

Throughout the winter we partnered with the District of Tofino and Yuułu?ił?ath First Nation to offer Mt. Washington day trips for youth of all ages and skill level. We have partnered with Relic Surf Shop and Endless Ride Fitness to provide affordable surfing, stand-up paddleboarding and yoga classes for teens. We also partnered with Westcoast Community Resources Society to facilitate Guys and Girls of the Wild Coast program in April and will partner again in July to run another program.

We have also been partnering with Central Westcoast Forest Society to provide teens with volunteer restoration opportunities; we are currently working on removing the invasive Japanese Knotweed from around Big Beach.

We have also parterened with Pacific Rim Arts Society to offer a photography workshop with Douglas Ludwig on Tuesdays, as well as an acrylic painting workshop with Rebekka Lim on Thursdays. Both of these workshops ran for the month of May.

## Funding partnerships

Funding partnerships allow programs to run, without this funding there would not be the possibility of programs outside of the youth drop-in. Our current funding partnerships include:

- Westcoast Community Resources Society
- Clayoquot Biosphere Trust
- Pacific Rim Arts Society
- Relic Surf Shop

The previously mentioned photography and acrylic painting workshops were offered to teens free of charge due to a \$1200 Youth Workshop grant that Pacific Rim Arts Society received from Clayoquot Biosphere Trust.

We currently have a \$4100 Youth Leadership grant from Clayoquot Biosphere Trust that has to be used by August 31, 2013. We are partnering with Westcoast Community Resources Society to offer a summer program focusing on outdoor activity and leadership, similar to the Guys and Girls of the Wild Coast program.

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We have also received funding for a "Back to the Basics" program from Clayoquot Biosphere Trust. We have been granted \$3000 to run cooking programs for the teens. This program will focus on basic cooking and preserving techniques and will use primarily local and organic ingredients.

Relic Surf Shop held a fundraiser at The Floathouse Bar and Grill; they raised additional funds which were given to The Edge Youth Room. This money was used in combination with money from a BCRPA Move for Health Day grant to host an affordable stand-up paddleboarding day at Kenedy Lake on Monday, May 20, 2013.

We are always exploring new ways to fundraise in order to be able to provide a variety of programs for teens. As well, additional funding options are continuously being researched.

Weekly Movie Nights	18-25 teens	Teen movie nights have been a great success, every Wednesday afternoon the Teen Room is full of anxiously awaiting teens. We often bake cookies or make dinner before the movie; this night often results in grilled-cheese making competitions, group teen-cuddles on the couch, song and dance, intense card games and lots of laughter. The teens tell me a on a regular basi how much they LOVE movie night and how they have gained many new friends by having the Teen Room to hang out at on a consistent basis.
Play at the Cultch Theatre in Vancouver	12 teens	The play was really amazing I it was called Agokwe and is a "star-crossed, queer love story about two teenage boys from neighbouring reserves, bound by their mutual love for movement". The play tackled issues of social isolation, lost traditions, and homophobia. The play was very well received b the teens and they were given the opportunity to meet and question the actor. This day exposed teens from Hitacu, Ucluelet, Esowista, and Ty-histan to a wonderful theatrical experience that focused on a lot of current and challenging issues for today's youth.
Mt. Washington Trips - Five trips in total	11-13 teens	These trips were huge amounts of fun for all who participated. For each Mt Washington trip we had teens from Tofino, Esowista, Ucluelet, and Hitacu. These trips were a great opportunity for teens of different backgrounds to interact with one another.
Guys and Girls of the Wild Coast	18 teens	There were 11 guys and 7 girls that took part in Guys and Girls of the Wildcoast. There were so many highlights over this three day program, the teens were amazing! We went surfing and stand-up paddle boarding in the pouring, sideways rain. We also hiked Mt. Ozzard on a day with no visibility. The teens didn't complain at all, they just had fun and laughed the whole time. They made 20 pizzas, rolled all the dough, prepared all the toppings, took leadership and delegated tasks to one another, laughed histerically and ate until they couldn't eat anymore. This program was an amazing opportunity for teens of different backgrounds to come together and interact with one another. There was also a portion of the program that focussed or prevention and early intervention of topics including - eating disorders, healthy relationships, depression, suicide, self-harm, and abuse.
Earth Day Beach Clean- up	10 teens	We went down to Florencia Bay for an afternoon beach clean-up to celebrat Earth Day. It was a gorgeous, sunny day and we collected a few bags of debris.
Photography with Douglas Ludwig	5-7 teens	Partnership with Pacific Rim Arts Society to offer a four week photography course for all teens. This course was offered free of charge due to a grant tha Pacific Rim Arts Society received from Clayoquot Biosphere Trust.
Acrylic Painting with Rebekka Lim	4-6 teens	Partnership with Pacific Rim Arts Society to offer a four week acrylic painting course for all teens. This course was offered free of charge due to a grant tha Pacific Rim Arts Society received from Clayoquot Biosphere Trust.
Basebali	10 teens, but grows every week	The teens meet with Chris Sylvester up at Tugwell Fields to work on their baseball skills. There hasn't been a teen baseball league in Ucluelet for years so it has taken some work to get it going again. The teens are receptive to th idea and each week we receive more and more participants.
Stand-up Paddle Boarding	11 teens	In partnership with Endless Ride Fitness we took 11 teens out to Kenedy Lak for an afternoon of Stand-up paddleboarding. The weather was grey and col but the teens were unphased. They had a great time! We paddled around th lake for a couple of hours without anyone ending up in the water. At the ver end, all of the teens decided to get into their bathingsuits and jump in the freezing cold lake. It was a good test of their true westcoastness. We all had great time! The teens would like to see a weekly stand-up paddleboard club that runs out of the teen room.

# **Program Highlights**

### Mt. Washington Trips

Over the winter we teamed up with Tofino Parks and Recreation to host five Mt. Washington trips! We had approximately 10-12 teens per trip from Ucluelet, Tofino and the surrounding communities. On two of the trips, we also combined forces with Alysson Thicke, the youth worker in Hitacu, and brought a second van full of teens from Hitacu. These trips were very successful and provided teens with an opportunity to spend quality time with their peers.



### Guys and Girls of the Wild Coast

The Guys and Girls of the Wild Coast program is a partnership between the District of Ucluelet Youth Program, Westcoast Community Resources Society and Ucluelet Secondary School. The goal of this program is to promote a balance of physical, mental, and social health among west coast guys and girls in grades 7 to 12. Guys and Girls of the Wild Coast ran for three days in April this year, there were 18 participants from Ucluelet, Tofino, Hitacu, Esowista and Ty-Histanis. This program combined surfing, stand-up paddleboarding, yoga, cooking, and hiking with some mental-health related workshops, conversations and movies. It was a great combination of hard skills and mental skills, providing the teens with an opportunity explore their physical and mental capacities.



### Movie nights

Movie nights have been consistently taking place on Wednesday evenings; these nights bring out at least 18-22 teens every week. The movies are chosen by the teens but regulated by myself to ensure appropriate content. We often incorporate dinner into these evenings; on evenings where we make dinner, the teens are asked to contribute \$2 each.



### Stand-up Paddleboarding

In partnership with Endless Ride Fitness, we took 11 teens out to Kennedy Lake for some stand-up paddleboarding. It was so much fun! The weather was cold and grey but the westcoast teens were unphased; they paddled around and even jumped into the freezing cold lake. This program was offered for Move for Health Day and was possible due to a generous donation from Relic Surf Shop, as well as a Move for Health Day grant from BC Parks and Recreation Association in order to encourage life long fitness and health.



# Testimonials:

The following are testimonials from locals within the community who interact with youth on a regular basis and have therefore, noticed first-hand differences in behavior of youth since The Edge Youth Room has been in consistent operation.

"I started working in Ucluelet in March 2010. I attended around 10 files that summer where youth were heavily intoxicated to the point where they were sick and passed out unconscious. Many of these files were minor, and ended in adults/parents picking up their children.

I attended a number incidents where youth were annoying neighbors, or causing mischief. Local hangouts were always busy with youth "hanging around" sometimes deterring customers from entering the store, simply due to the fact that kids were sitting on the stoop out front.

Since the opening of the Youth Room, the RCMP in Ucluelet have seen a significant reduction in calls relating to youth intoxication, mischiefs and annoying circumstances. The Youth Room at the Community Center is a valuable asset to Ucluelet and the area. It brings youth together in a positive setting and gives them something to do, something to put effort into and something to be proud of".

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"I have had the pleasure of working with the youth within our community. I teach a yoga class in the community centre on the same days as the after school program youth programs. The teens are always very up beat and happy, greeting me with big smiles and awkward posture. Every time I come through the door Mandala is pouring out soup, baking cookies, coordinating some activity or just providing a safe and fun environment for the youth.

Last month we took 18 kids on a tour of our inner harbour. To say it was raining would be putting it mildly. It was grey, pouring rain and chilly. Without hesitation, the teens put on their wetsuits, grabbed a paddle and headed out for their scavenger hunt. They answered all the questions with ease and nailed thier human pyramids through team work and patience.

All in all I would have to say that the youth in our community are great individuals. I think the programs and organizers running them are providing a fun and healthy environment for kids to be kids".
