





FCBC and FLNRO will process your application when they receive a copy of this sponsorship letter, and will notify you if additional information is required. FLNRO will then forward recommendations to Government to obtain approval for the transfer of Crown land. 

Dear Mayor St. Jacques:

I understand that local officials met with representatives from my office and the ministry on Tuesday, September 22 at the 2015 UBCM Convention to discuss the Barkley Community Forest and Ucluelet Coast Guard station lands. I regret that I was unable to attend this year's convention, but was pleased to hear that you had a productive meeting.

I was pleased to announce the issuance of the Barkley Community Forest Agreement at the British Columbia Community Forest Association Annual General Meeting in June 2015. We look forward to working with the Barkley Community Forest Limited Partnership as they submit a forest stewardship plan and begin active operations.

With respect to the Coast Guard station, these lands are under reserve for navigational aid use, and the Coast Guard currently maintains the rights to use the lands for this purpose. While the lands remain under federal jurisdiction at present, Ucluelet's application for a Sponsored Crown Grant is currently being processed. I have asked ministry staff to ensure that Ucluelet officials were kept apprised of progress on a regular basis.

Again, thank you for bringing these significant issues to our attention.



As Tourism Ucluelet is in the process of moving its year-end to a calendar year, the attached budget will reflect primarily administrative/operational costs, as well as items which have been carried over and had prior commitment in 2015.

The purpose of the adjustment of the year-end is to allow for better alignment of Board members, reporting, budgeting and project management. 

Remembering Working People: Plaques Around the Province Project

In 2010, the BC Labour Heritage Centre

partnered with the Vancouver Convention Centre

on the installation of a series of educational panels

along the interior and exterior of the new

Convention Centre. The Convention Centre

covered the cost of producing the panels and we

provided the research.



A series of plaques documenting events and people in British Columbia's labour history are on display at the Vancouver Convention Centre.

Building on this success, the Labour Heritage Centre has launched the "Remembering Working People: Plaques Around the Province Project". Our aim is to extend the Convention Centre program to areas outside of Vancouver.

We are seeking nominations of events, groups, individuals and places throughout the province that demonstrate the contributions of working people to the history of British Columbia.

Our criteria includes, but is not strictly limited to:

- defining events, actions, episodes, movements, or experiences that played a significant role in the history of the labour movement and working people in British Columbia
- groups and individuals that made a lasting contribution to labour and working history
- places that hold a direct association with a significant aspect of BC or Canadian labour history

When proposing a suitable event and location for a plaque, nominators will be asked to consider locations where they will be accessible to the public and contribute to an understanding of the foundations laid by working people in the province's history.

The Labour Heritage Centre will cover the cost of research and promotion of each plaque, including links to background materials on our website.

Costs

We have chosen Ornamental Bronze, located in Richmond, to produce the plaques. Ornamental Bronze is a union shop and their product meets our primary requirement for longevity. They produced the 2010 plaque for the commemoration of the On to Ottawa Trek, shown at right. The size of this plaque is 18" x 29". Each cast bronze plaque is individually crafted and will

cost \$3,000 - \$5,000; depending on its size and complexity. We are asking nominators to contribute at least one-third of the cost of each plaque.

1. **THAT** Council authorize the closure of the Municipal Office for the 2015 holiday season from Monday, December 21, 2015 through Friday, January 01, 2016. The office will reopen on Monday, January 4, 2016.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to identify the District of Ucluelet's hours of operation during the 2015 holiday season.

BACKGROUND:

Similar to past last holiday seasons, it is standard practice to close the administration office and public works and parks departments for two weeks over the Christmas period to coincide with school breaks.

This year, it is proposed that the District office and Public Works & Parks departments be closed to the public on Monday, December 21, 2015 and reopen on Monday, January 4, 2016. All staff will be permitted time off during the two-week period on the basis that either vacation time or banked overtime will be used to offset all but statutory holidays. Staff will be permitted to work provided their supervisor agrees and there is worthwhile work to be performed, but all staff are being strongly encouraged to take the time off.

As in previous years, the Public Works & Parks department will ensure that sufficient personnel are available should any emergencies occur.

SUBJECT: PROPOSED SMOKING CONTROL BYLAW

ATTACHMENT(s): APPENDIX A -TOBACCO CONTROL ACT LEGISLATION, SECTION 2.2 AND 2.3

RECOMMENDATION(S):

- 1. **THAT** a Smoking Control Bylaw be created that includes any of the applicable clauses below:
 - a. A ban on smoking in all public playgrounds, playing fields, designated public spaces, public trails and all municipal parks; and/or
 - b. Increase the current 3 metre buffer zone for smoking near doorways, open windows, air intakes and bus stops to 8 metres; **and/or**
 - c. A ban on smoking in restaurant/bar patios, as well as 8 meters from customer service areas, including patios; <u>and/or</u>
 - d. Apply a fine based enforcement strategy;
- 2. THAT a Smoking Control Bylaw, be considered and determined to not proceed further.

PURPOSE:

To provide Council with information on a Ucluelet-specific Smoking Control Bylaw to augment the scope of the provincial "Tobacco Control Act" legislation.

BACKGROUND:

Smoking and the selling of tobacco products are controlled provincially by the "Tobacco Control Act". It is currently against the law to smoke in any indoor public place or worksite, including pubs, bars and restaurants. It is also illegal to smoke in public transit vehicles, transit shelters, taxis and work vehicles. There is a 3 meter non-smoking "buffer zone" around public and work place doorways, opening windows and air intakes including apartments and condominiums. Smoking in the workplace is also controlled by the Workers Compensation Board's Occupational Health and Safety Regulations.

Many BC Municipalities have opted to impose anti-smoking policies. These municipalities have gone above and beyond the provincial legislation and enacted municipal level smoking bylaws. Some examples of these augmentations are:

- The Ucluelet Community Center uses the LEED standard of banning smoking within 8 meters of doors/windows
- The City of Vancouver bylaw bans smoking on restaurant/bar patios and bans smoking within 6 meters of doors/windows, as well as 6 meters from customer service areas, including patios.
- The City of Richmond bans smoking within 25m of a sports field, 6m from any service building but make allowances for smoking rooms.
- The District of Tofino bans smoking in any part of a municipal park.
- The City of Port Alberni bans smoking within 15 metres of any of the city's 13 playgrounds.

In total, more than three-quarters (76.7%) of the province's population lives, works, and plays in Municipalities with some restrictions on smoking in public. The main purpose for creating a no Smoking Control Bylaws in public areas is to protect people from the health hazards of second-hand tobacco smoke. Other negative impacts of public smoking is the littering associated with cigarette butts and the fire hazard that cigarettes could cause in our parks and trail systems.

HEALTH AND ECONOMIC CONSEQUENCES

As tobacco is a harmful and addictive product that has health and economic consequences to our community it is important that these considerations be recognized. Tobacco use is the single most preventable cause of morbidity and mortality in BC. Tobacco use also has a clear and measurable economic cost such as the cost of the tobacco products, the direct health care costs, the lost income due to premature death and disability and the fire damage caused by careless cigarette use.

FINES AND ENFORCEMENT:

A fine based enforcement strategy is the standard approach to most Bylaw infractions. Some regions are taking another approach, one of encouraging compliance with public pressure, targeted education and signage. The City of Port Alberni has recently adopted this approach to what they consider so far to be a positive outcome. The education aspect of this strategy would consist of a social media outreach, pamphlets and posters at key locations such as the District Office, the Ucluelet Community Center and local businesses. The Chamber of Commerce and Tourism Ucluelet could also be utilized to promote the positive aspects of a smoke free Ucluelet. This education strategy would foster the "citizen enforcement" approach and empower our local community members with the authority to self-police violators rather than the standard fine approach.

SUMMARY:

Public smoking poses a number of risks to the health, safety and to our natural environment. The regulating of public smoking beyond what the current provincial legislation regulates is becoming the provincial norm with urban municipalities setting the pace. Ucluelet is becoming known for its exceptional natural environment. Public smoking and the associated litter and fire danger would seem counterproductive towards this image.

10FZ,

- (3) A person must not sell or offer for sale cigarettes from an opened package.
- (4) A person must not sell or offer to sell tobacco at retail at a location to which a prohibition order under section 6.1 (2) (b) applies.

Tobacco not to be sold in certain places

- 2.1 (1) A person must not deal in, sell, offer for sale or distribute tobacco in any of the following places:
 - (a) land, or a building or structure, used primarily for the purposes of a hospital or other health care services;
 - (b) the campus of a public university or other public postsecondary institution;
 - (c) a building or structure that is owned or leased by a public body that is used primarily for athletic or recreation purposes;
 - (d) a building or structure that is owned or leased by the government or a Crown corporation or agency;
 - (e) a prescribed place.
 - (2) Subject to subsection (3), if any person contravenes subsection (1) in respect of a place, each manager, owner and lessee of the place is deemed to have contravened that subsection and each is liable for the contravention.
 - (3) It is a defence to a charge under subsection (2) if the manager, owner or lessee, as applicable, demonstrates that he or she exercised reasonable care and diligence to prevent the contravention.
 - (4) Subsection (2) applies whether or not the person who dealt in, sold, offered for sale or distributed tobacco, or any other person, is charged with contravening subsection (1).

No smoking or other tobacco use in schools

2.2 (1) In this section:

"board" means

- (a) a board or francophone education authority under the School Act, or
- (b) an authority under the Independent School Act;

"school property" means property that is

- (a) owned or leased by, or operated under the authority of, a board, and
- (b) used for the purposes of delivering educational programs or other learning programs,

and includes real property and improvements, and personal property;

"superintendent" means

- (a) the superintendent of schools under the School Act, or
- (b) a person exercising similar authority in respect of an independent school.
- (2) Subject to subsection (3), a person must not smoke or use tobacco, or hold lighted tobacco, in or on school property.
- (3) Subsection (2) does not apply to the ceremonial use of tobacco in or on school property if the ceremonial use of tobacco is approved by the board and it is performed
 - (a) in relation to a traditional aboriginal cultural activity, or
 - (b) by a prescribed group for a prescribed purpose.
- (4) Subject to subsection (5), if any person contravenes subsection (2), the board, superintendent and principal each are deemed to have contravened that subsection and each is liable for the contravention.
- (5) It is a defence to a charge under subsection (4) if the board, superintendent or principal demonstrates that each exercised reasonable care and diligence to prevent the contravention.
- (6) Subsection (4) applies whether or not the person who smoked or used tobacco, or held lighted tobacco, or any other person, is charged with contravening subsection (2).

No smoking in or near certain places

- **2.3** (1) Subject to subsection (2), a person must not smoke tobacco, or hold lighted tobacco,
 - (a) in any building, structure, vehicle or any other place that is fully or substantially enclosed and
 - (i) is a place to which the public is ordinarily invited or permitted access, either expressly or by implication, whether or not a fee is charged for entry,
 - (ii) is a workplace, or
 - (iii) is a prescribed place, or

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- (b) within a prescribed distance from a doorway, window or air intake of a place described in paragraph (a).
- (2) Subsection (1) does not apply to the ceremonial use of tobacco
 - (a) in relation to a traditional aboriginal cultural activity, or
 - (b) by a prescribed group for a prescribed purpose.
- (3) Subject to subsection (5), if any person contravenes subsection (1) in respect of a place described under subsection (1) (a) (i) or (iii), each manager, owner and lessee of the place is deemed to have contravened that subsection and each is liable for the contravention.
- (4) Subject to subsection (5), if any person contravenes subsection (1) in respect of a workplace, the employer is deemed to have contravened that subsection and is liable for the contravention.
- (5) It is a defence to a charge under subsection (3) or (4) if the manager, owner, lessee or employer, as applicable, demonstrates that he or she exercised reasonable care and diligence to prevent the contravention.
- (6) Subsections (3) and (4) apply whether or not the person who smoked tobacco, or held lighted tobacco, or any other person, is charged with contravening subsection (1).

Prohibitions on display or promotion of tobacco products

- 2.4 (1) A person must not
 - (a) display tobacco products, or
 - (b) advertise or promote the use of tobacco by means of a sign or otherwise

in any manner prohibited by the regulations.

- (2) Despite subsection (1), the minister may order an exemption from a provision of the regulations made in relation to this section in respect of a person who retails tobacco from a building or structure that
 - (a) is a protected heritage property within the meaning of the Local Government Act or of the Vancouver Charter, and
 - (b) in the opinion of the minister, has a historic connection to the retail of tobacco.

Enforcement officers

3 (1) The minister may designate as enforcement officers any persons or categories of persons the minister considers qualified to be so designated.
